


spirit of entrepreneurship made possible by forward-thinking civic leaders.

THE OZARKS

The Ozarks, also known as the Ozark Mountains or Ozark Plateau, is a region in the United States that includes 93 counties in four different states including parts of Missouri, Arkansas, Oklahoma, and southeastern Kansas. The Ozarks covers approximately 50,000 square miles.



WHAT IS A ZIZZER?

Neighboring communities are Bears, Eagles, and Bobcats, but West Plains is famous for being home to the Zizzers, the only ones in the whole country! But what is a Zizzer? It all started in 1907 when the senior class put together an eight-page commemorative booklet for the junior class, presented on Class Day. The juniors loved the idea, so they put together their own booklet in 1908. This was the beginning of an annual yearbook tradition at the school. When they presented the book to faculty member Phoebe Davidson, she exclaimed, "What a Zizzer!" a term which is said to have been a colloquialism for lightning or a flash from the sky. The name was put on the 1908 edition, and it stuck. It continues to be the name of the West Plains High School yearbook, as well as academic and sports teams across the district. A lightning bolt is the school logo/mascot. In recent years, school officials have coined another definition of a

Zizzer: an expert in any activity, a winner!




WEST PLAINS REGIONAL AIRPORT

The West Plains Regional Airport (FAA identifier UNO) is located at 4523 County Road 2340 in Pomona, MO. The airport is a full-service airport with an 18/36 5102x75 ft. asphalt runway. Amenities include a pilot's lounge/quarters, unisex shower, kitchen area, spacious lobby, conference room and Wi-Fi. Hangar rental is available. The airport is located 11 miles north of West Plains. FAMOUS WEST PLAINSIANS

Porter Wagoner achieved fame as a country music singer, songwriter, and musician.

Born on August 12, 1927, and raised on a farm south of West Plains, Porter started his public music career while he worked as a meat cutter after his family moved to town in the early 1940s. As a popular local entertainer, he did live performances on radio station KWPM-AM from the butcher shop where he worked. In 1951 he was hired to perform on KWTO in Springfield, Mo., which led to a contract with RCA Victor. In 1953, his song "Trademark" became a hit for Carl Smith. Beginning in 1955 he was featured on Ozark Jubilee, a Springfield-based television show with a national audience. He joined the Grand Ole Opry in 1958. He would go on to have 81 charted records and his own syndicated television program, The Porter Wagoner Show, which aired from 1960 to 1981. The show introduced Dolly Parton who was part of the show, and Porter's vocal partner, from 1967 to 1976. With his flashy, custom-made suits and blond pompadour, Porter was a popular performer in Nashville for many years where he was known informally as "Mr. Grand Ole Opry." The longest street in West Plains is "Porter Wagoner Boulevard," named for our beloved native son who died on October 28, 2007.

Jan Howard made her mark on the country music industry as a recording artist and songwriter.

She was born in West Plains on March 13, 1929, with the given name Lula Grace Johnson. It was her second husband songwriter Harlan Howard who encouraged her career, which took off in 1960 with her first major hit "The One You Slip Around With." She signed with Decca Records and continued to have hit singles beginning in the mid-60s, eventually placing 30 songs on the Billboard Country Charts. She teamed up with Bill Anderson, and the duo also charted with several songs and toured together until the mid-1970s. Several

tragic life circumstances nearly led her to give up her career, but she released more albums into the 1980s. She also took up writing, including publication of her autobiography *Sunshine and Shadow*. She became a member of the Grand Ole Opry in 1971 and continued to perform there until 2019. Jan died on March 28, 2020.

Gilbert Ray "Speck" Rhodes

was a country music comedian and entertainer best known for his appearances on Porter Wagoner's television show. He was born July 16, 1915, on a farm which is now the location of the Heart of the Ozarks Fairgrounds, and coincidentally, adjacent to the Welcome Center. Speck was from a musical family. He and his three siblings toured the RKO vaudeville circuit and barnstormed throughout north central Arkansas where the family had moved following the 1918 influenza epidemic. Speck played banjo and bass fiddle, and it was during the 1930s that he developed his comic character. Through no connection of mutual birthplace, in 1960 Speck auditioned in Nashville for Porter Wagoner's TV show. He landed the gig which led to a lasting friendship between the two men. He and Porter were the only two original members when the show stopped airing in 1981. Speck died March 19, 2000.

Ha Ha Tonka is an alternative/indie band originally formed in West Plains and named for Ha Ha Tonka State Park in Camdenton, Missouri. They signed with the Bloodshot Records label and released their first album, *Buckle in the Bible Belt*, in 2007. They have since released an additional five studio albums and continue to perform regularly, including occasional appearances in their hometown. Among their accomplishments, in 2017 they were the musical guests on the Conan O'Brien Late Night Show. They continue to shine with tight harmonies which complement their considerable musical talent and song-writing skills. We're proud to claim Ha Ha Tonka as our own!



Ha Ha Tonka

Dick Van Dyke, a well-known, award-winning actor, comedian, writer, singer, and dancer, is perhaps the most famous West Plains son. However, his tenure in our town was the briefest.

He was born here on December 13, 1925, but he and his parents stayed only until the next spring when they moved back to their hometown, Danville, Ill., where Dick would grow up and attend high school before joining the US military in 1944, serving stateside entertaining troops as a member of the Special Services. During the late 1940s, he launched an award-winning career which has spanned seven decades in film, television, and the theatre. Dick is the recipient of five Primetime Emmys, a Tony, and a Grammy Award, and was inducted into the Television Hall of Fame in 1995.

Reathel Bean was born August 24, 1942, in West Plains. Perhaps less well known than some of our other famous sons, Reathel had a decades-long acting career as an entertainer in theater, television and film. On Broadway he was seen in multiple plays, including *Our Town* with Paul Newman, *Inherit the Wind*, *Big River*, *Baby* and *Doonesbury*. On television he appeared in the *Law & Order* series as well as *Third Watch*, *Ed, Spin City*, *White Collar*, *Nurse Jackie*, *The Blacklist* and more. His film credits include *Box of Moonlight*, *Going in Style*, *The Nanny Diaries*, *The Good Shepherd* and *Dancer in the Dark*. He also did audio work. Reathel grew up in West Plains, the son of Thelma (Luna) and Floyd Bean. He graduated from West Plains High School in 1960, where he credited his teacher, Larry Clark, as inspiring his love of acting. Reathel earned a degree from Drake University in 1964 and went on to make his home in New York before moving to Chicago in 2022 where he passed away on October 4, 2023.

Elwin "Preacher" Roe was a professional baseball player who started his career as a St. Louis Cardinal in 1938 and who would go on to play for the Pittsburgh Pirates from 1944-47 and finally, for the legendary Brooklyn Dodgers from 1948-54 where he had a stellar career as a pitcher, including in 1951 when he posted a 22-3 win-loss record. He was a five-time All-Star and, along with the rest of the Dodgers team, is immortalized in Roger Kahn's book *The Boys of Summer*. Born on February 26, 1916, in Ash Flat, Ark., Preacher grew up in Viola, Ark. However, after he retired from baseball, he moved to West Plains where for many years he operated a grocery store and was – and still is – claimed and revered as our town's very own "boy of summer." Preacher died on November 9, 2008.





Bill Virdon was a professional baseball outfielder, manager, and coach. He was born June 9, 1931, in Michigan to parents who were originally from Missouri but who had moved away to find work during the Great Depression. In 1944 the Virdons moved to Howell County where Bill attended West Plains High School, excelling at sports and graduating with the class of 1949. He started his Minor League Baseball career in 1950 as part of the New York Yankees organization. His Major League career began in 1955 with the St. Louis Cardinals where he was named National League Rookie of the Year. The next year Bill was traded to the Pittsburgh Pirates where he remained through his playing years and was part of the team as it won the 1960 World Series. Retiring as a player after the 1965 season, he went on to coach and manage with several organizations and continued to be involved in baseball through the years. Bill passed away on November 23, 2021.

Tedd Gulic was an outfielder for the St. Louis Browns from 1930 through the 1933 season. He was born January 2, 1907, in the neighboring community of Koshkonong, Mo., and died January 28, 2000, in West Plains where he had made his home as a successful businessman after retiring from baseball.

Stephen W. Thompson holds a special distinction in military aviation history. In 1918, he was the first man in U.S. military service to shoot down an enemy plane in air-to-air combat. Born in West Plains in 1894, Thompson left home to attend the University of Missouri, Columbia. When the U.S. entered WWI in 1917, he was a senior. The college offered seniors early graduation to encourage joining the service, so Thompson enlisted in the Army at 23 years old where he went on to make history. At the war's end, he returned home to West Plains as a local hero. Around 1920 he moved to Dayton, Ohio, where he lived out the rest of his days, passing away in 1977.

Jim the Wonder Dog is the Official Wonder Dog of the State of Missouri. Born on March 10, 1925, Jim was a Llewellyn setter with astounding intelligence who performed unexplainable feats. Jim was born in the state of Louisiana but when he was just a pup, he found a home with Sam Van Arsdale in West Plains. Sam discovered that his dog was a phenomenal naturally gifted bird dog, but also a dog with supernatural skills. One hot afternoon Sam suggested that they stop hunting and go sit under a hickory tree to cool off. There were lots of trees around, but Jim walked directly to the hickory. Sensing it was more than a fluke, Sam named other trees, and Jim correctly identified them all. The baffling behavior grew from there and was put to the test many times, including by professors at the University of Missouri who asked Jim to perform tasks in multiple languages and in Morse code. He was asked in French to find a certain car license plate number and asked in German to find a girl in a blue dress. On and on. Jim responded correctly every time to multiple commands. None of the experts, or the thousands of people who witnessed the tests he was subjected to over the years, could ever determine the source of Jim's amazing powers. Sam, who himself knew only English, once told a reporter, "I never asked Jim a question he could not answer. He understood every language, written or spoken...In fact, Jim knew everything." Jim died March 18, 1937, and is buried in Marshall, Mo., where he had lived with Sam for most of his life. Discover more by visiting the website jimthewonderdog.org.

This points of interest list is designed to give long-time Porter Wagoner fans along with those who are new to his music, a glimpse into his hometown and how he got his start as a country music legend. Known as "Mr. Grand Ole Opry," our native son was born August 12, 1927, on a farm just south of West Plains. He moved to a small home in West Plains with his family when he was in sixth grade.

Along with his well-respected credentials as a performer and songwriter, he was famous for his blond pompadour hairdo, flashy 'Nudie suits' (created for Porter by designer Nudie Cohn), and a long-running television series (1960-1981) "The Porter Wagoner Show," where he introduced Dolly Parton to the world. He had a fabulous decades-long career, becoming a member of the Grand Ole Opry in 1957 and remaining a member for 50 years, until his death on October 28, 2007.



Porter Wagoner Trail

1 To follow the Porter trail, start inside the Ozark Heritage Welcome Center, 2999 Porter Wagoner Blvd., and see our Porter display. He's featured on our "Famous West Plainsians" mural along with Dick Van Dyke, fellow country music star Jan Howard, and baseball players Preacher Roe and Bill Virdon.



We also have one of his signature rhinestone-covered suits – the last one he ever purchased, in fact (you can see why he was known as the "Thin Man from West Plains!") – and other memorabilia in our Porter display case. Don Wardin, Porter's long-time steel guitar player and road manager for Dolly Parton, also has ties to our area and is represented in our display area.

Right outside the center, be sure to see "Porter's Guitar" an outdoor chainsaw carving by Jason Morton of Eagle Ridge Chainsaw Carvings of Strafford, Missouri. When one of our big oak trees died in 2023, we knew what we should do, get a carving of Porter's guitar! Completed by Jason in two days in early 2024, it's a centerpiece of our Porter collection. The sculpture is inspired by the guitar designed by Greg Rich and featured on the cover of Porter's 53rd and final studio album, "Wagonmaster," released June 5, 2007.

2 Before heading out, look to the left (as you're leaving the center's front door) at the Heart of the Ozarks Fairgrounds. In an interesting coincidence, Porter's long-time comedian sidekick, Speck Rhodes, was born in 1915 on his grandparents' farm where the fairgrounds is now located. His family moved away within a few years, but Speck is one of our own, too!

The grandstand at the fairgrounds was also the site of a concert by Porter, along with his band, the Wagonmasters, and Dolly, September 25, 1971, for Porter Wagoner Day when he came home to be honored with the naming of Porter Wagoner Boulevard. When you leave the center, you'll take a right on the boulevard (which is also Highway 63) known simply as "Porter" when the locals talk about it. "Cruising on Porter" was a popular past-time for teenagers for many years.

3 Stay in the right lane and in one-half mile take the Business 63 exit toward West Plains. At the stop sign, take a left and then immediately get into the right lane to turn right to drive down the rest of Porter Wag-

oner Boulevard. It will take you toward Downtown West Plains. In 1.7 miles, at the second stoplight, turn left onto Broadway. In one-half mile, just past the Missouri Avenue stoplight, on the right will be the Missouri State University-West Plains Pace Industrial Science Center. The main part of the building was constructed in 1939. It originally was home to the Coca Cola - Dr. Pepper Bottling Company where Porter had a job in the mid-1940s.

Continue on Broadway and take a right at the next stoplight onto Washington Avenue. You'll be entering the Courthouse Square Historic District. Nationally designated since 2003, the district encompasses 46 contributing buildings in the heart of Downtown West Plains. They were the buildings in place when Porter's family moved to town from "the country" in the early 1940s.

4 On the second block of Washington, on the right side of the street is the Avenue Theatre, originally a movie house, now a community theatre space. It was built and opened in 1950 just one year before Porter would start his professional music career at KWTO in Springfield, Missouri.

5 Continue up Washington Avenue and onto Court Square. (Turn right, it's one-way traffic around the courthouse.) Halfway around, at 47 Court Square, you'll find Perry's Barbershop. This building was home to Sid Vaughan's Market where Porter had landed steady work as a meat cutter and where he was working when he was discovered. Enter the side of the building, on Aid Avenue, to visit Johnny Hatchet's Axe Throwing & Coffee House. There's a neat display area which features some photos, taken by photographer Dennis Crider, of different times Porter (sometimes with Dolly) visited his hometown.

Sid Vaughan, owner of the market, gave Porter plenty of encouragement in his music, even allowing him to bring his guitar to work to play when business was slow. Eventually Sid started sponsoring daily live shows featuring Porter singing from the market to advertise the specials of the day. Broadcast on KWPM, the local radio station which had launched in 1947 and is still on the air today, the shows proved to be Porter's big break. A bus driver, who had a

morning route through West Plains, heard the show and told a KWTO Springfield, Missouri, radio station representative that Porter was worth a listen. Lou Black from KWTO drove down to West Plains, listened to the show on his car radio in front of the market, and approached Porter about coming to work at KWTO as a staff entertainer. It was a station which had been instrumental in the careers of several big names in country music, including Chet Atkins, who had been there and left for Nashville just before Porter's arrival. Porter signed with RCA Victor records the following year.

6 Just across Aid Avenue, in the corner of the Square where the large Aid Hardware building is, you'll find an engraved commemorative plaque on the light pole in front of #9 Court Square. It honors Porter as one of our famous native sons.



7 If you're in town at the right time, you can venture up to the Harlin Museum to see a small display of Porter memorabilia, including one of his guitars. The museum is staffed by volunteers and is typically open noon to 4 p.m., Thursdays through Sundays. On Aid Avenue, go to the second street, Worcester Avenue, and take a right. The museum is at the top of the hill, 405 Worcester.



Either way, when you're done, drive around to exit on the west side of the square (between the historic opera house and the county office building) onto West Main Street. Follow West Main for a one-half mile, passing by the campus of Missouri State University-West Plains and the historic Methodist Church. In one-half mile, bear right and you will be back on Porter Wagoner Blvd. Follow it for 2.8 miles and you will arrive back at the Welcome Center where you might want to take a selfie with our Porter Wagoner Street Sign. Post on Facebook or Instagram and tag Explore West Plains if you do!

Come back into the center, tell us you've completed the tour, and we'll enter your name in a drawing for some Welcome Center merchandise.

Some of the information for this tour came from an interview of Porter Wagoner by Michael Cochran in 1979. It appeared in the West Plains Gazette magazine Issue Number Five.

The Avenue Theatre, featuring Art Deco details, originally opened in 1950 as a movie house. The very first film shown was *Fancy Pants*, starring Bob Hope and Lucille Ball. After closing in the early 1980s, the building sat empty for several years until a group of local citizens formed a not-for-profit organization, Arts on the Avenue, to oversee its renovation. The building had been purchased by a local family and was donated to the organization. Starting in the 1990s, with minimal renovation, a homemade lightboard, and tin-can footlights, plays and talent shows were held in the auditorium.

Over the years, renovation and upgrades have continued and now the building is home to community theater and hosts other events. Stage plays are held throughout the year, with a major musical production each summer.

The Harlin Museum is a cultural arts center which has been telling the story of the Ozarks through art and history since 1972. The museum, a not-for-profit organization, is the exclusive owner of the L.L. Broadfoot art collection, which includes the original artwork and background notes of Lennis L. Broadfoot who published a book in 1944, "Pioneers of the Ozarks," a unique portrayal of early Ozark residents. The whole collection is typically on display in the summer months, with select pieces available for viewing year-round in the gallery space of the museum. Throughout the rest of the year in the gallery there are exhibits by local artists and other installations, such as model train displays during the holiday season. A small gift shop area has items for sale, including books on regional history. In the lower level of the museum there are historical artifacts, informational displays and other memorabilia.

The museum is typically open Thursdays through Sundays from noon to 4 p.m. except on holidays. It has an all-volunteer staff, so it is recommended to check ahead of time before making plans to visit due to the possibility of unscheduled closures. There is no admission charged, but donations are accepted and welcomed as the museum's main source of funding.





"The Protector," a massive-scale mural, was officially unveiled in late 2022 on the north wall of 14 Court Square in Luster Arcade.

The mural represents a beautiful collaboration between two artists stretching across decades to create a work of art which is breathtaking in both scope and meaning.

"The Protector" is based on a portrait by late local artist Charles E. Kimberlin II. The name was given to the original portrait by its current owners Crockett and Tonya Oaks, who commissioned the mural as owners of the building upon which it is painted.

Charles E. Kimberlin, II was a 1936 graduate of West Plains High School and longtime downtown business owner. During the dedication of the new mural, Kimberlin's son, Charles E. Kimberlin III, recalled that his father began painting as a hobby and did not have aspirations of selling his work, although many of his works were eventually sold. The artist responsible for the larger-than-life mural is Dr. Bolaji Ogunwo, a Nigerian artist who has more than 50 international art exhibitions to his credit. He currently is a studio artist and painting lecturer at the Department of Creative Arts, University of Lagos, Akoko, in Nigeria.

Dr. Ogunwo worked tirelessly for 10 days to recreate Kimberlin's original portrait while infusing touches of his own artistic style.

"The Protector" is not Dr. Ogunwo's only mural to adorn a wall in West Plains: In 2021, Crockett and Tonya Oaks commissioned a mural, "Helping Hands," that now graces an interior wall of Christos House West Plains Resale. In 2023, "Release the Peace" was added next to "The Protector." In 2024, he painted large canvases for the West Plains Public Library and Lincoln School.

"I have been many places in the states," said Dr. Ogunwo, "but West Plains is my second home."





1 "Rock of Ages" Monument




This monument was erected October 6, 1929, to mark the mass grave for the unidentified dead from a Friday the 13th, April 1928, explosion which destroyed the Bond Dance Hall where many area residents were enjoying an evening of music and dancing. While 19 were unidentified, there are 20 bodies buried at this site. One of the victims, a woman named Mabel Riley, had been identified, but her family chose to bury her with her husband who was among the unidentified dead. A total of 38 people died outright, with another dying of his injuries days later. Dubbed the "West Plains Dance Hall Explosion," the unexplained blast could be heard 26 miles away, and the event made national and international news. It remains to this day one of the deadliest dance hall disasters in U.S. history. (See additional information about the explosion on page 17, item #17 on the history tour.)

2 Alice Farmer Risley Marker & Bench

Oak Lawn Cemetery

Near Amyx & Lanton



Before she died in 1931, Alice Farmer Risley was the last known surviving Civil War nurse. Alice had volunteered as a nurse for the Union in New Orleans. Following the war's end, she married former patient, Samuel Risley, and the two moved to West Plains where Samuel established the South Missouri Journal newspaper. Samuel and Alice also served as Postmaster and Assistant Postmaster. Alice wrote of her days in West Plains, and much of our early history is preserved because of her.

3 Civil War Cannon Ball

Oak Lawn Cemetery

Near corner of Mark & Evans



Local legend has it that this cannon ball is the one that struck the original Howell County Courthouse during the West Plains Civil War skirmish in February 1862. During the war, West Plains was completely abandoned by its inhabitants, and only a handful of people remained in the entire county. Most who left the area returned to rebuild when the war was over.

4 Polly the Parrot Marker

Oak Lawn Cemetery

Near Evans & Amyx



This oldest area of the cemetery is the final resting place for many of the prominent early citizens of West Plains, including the Langstons and their parrot, Polly, the only known non-human buried in Oak Lawn. Polly was the pet of Dr. Thomas and Laura Bradford of Marshfield, Mo. On April 18, 1880, a tornado killed nearly 100 people in Marshfield, including Dr. Bradford. Following his death, Polly would so often ask, "Hey, ma. Where's pa?" that the grief-stricken widow sent the parrot to live with her daughter, Sallie Bradford Langston, in West Plains where Polly lived out her days as a well-known, local "celebrity." In 2023, Polly was recognized by the Pomeroy Foundation, added to their Legends & Lore program, and honored with a roadside marker.

5 Evans House | Grace Ave.



Built in the 1880s, six generations of the Evans family have lived, and continue to live, in the Evans house.

6 Knoerle/Hogan House | Grace Ave.



This house was completed in 1897 by Joseph Knoerle, the superintendent of a nearby 114-acre peach orchard. The next owners were Dr. Robert Hogan and his wife. One street over, north of Grace Ave., was the Christa Hogan Hospital. Named in honor of his mother, Robert established the hospital in a building that had formerly housed West Plains College. That structure is gone – Ozark Action is now located on the site – but it is where Dr. Hogan delivered Dick Van Dyke on Dec. 13, 1925.

7 McFarland House | Grace Ave.



On the other side of the street is the house built by John Henry McFarland and his wife, Egbertine Green McFarland, granddaughter of Union Brigadier

General Egbert B. Brown who died in the McFarland home on Feb. 12, 1902. Current owners are in the process of restoring the home from the foundation up, as you can see by its present condition.

8 All Saints' Episcopal Church

Curry Street



Built in 1888, little has changed since the cornerstone of All Saints' was laid. One of the oldest public buildings in the area, the church is considered second in West Plains public building age only to the First Presbyterian Church.

9 **Town Spring/Historic Post Office**
East Main Street

family lived upstairs. This arrangement continued over the years as the building changed hands, housing different businesses and families, including long-time owners Russ and Shirley Cochran. Russ, who died in 2020, was a noted publisher in the comic art industry and of the West Plains Gazette historical magazine. The family also owned several chimpanzees over the years and had large exterior cages installed to house them. The building is currently owned by a local attorney.

Under the Historic Post Office building (which previously also served as the town library and is currently a privately owned event center) runs the spring where members of the Howell family settled in October of 1839. West Plains is the county seat of Howell County, namesake of that pioneer family. In the early to mid-1800s "hardly a stick of timber grew within sight of the spring, only tall blue stem prairie grass." This historical note offers the reason for our town's eventual name, based on "the plains west of Thomasville," a neighboring Oregon County community which was established with a post office in 1846, two years before West Plains gained its post office in 1848.

10 **First Presbyterian Church**
Aid Avenue

The First Presbyterian Church is believed to be the oldest public structure in Howell County. The front portion of the church is original, built in 1885 at a cost of \$4,000. In 1910, the back portion of the building was added, with a further addition on the north side in 1978. The stained glass, original to the building, underwent restoration in 2018 as part of an extensive preservation project by the congregation.

11 **Zorn Building | Aid Avenue**

The W.J. Zorn building was built in 1912 by Will Zorn, publisher of the Howell County Gazette newspaper. The newspaper work was done downstairs, and the

12 **Courthouse Square
Historic District**

Listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 2003, the entire Historic District sits on approximately 11.5 acres and contains 46 historic buildings, ranging in age from 1881-1950. Not all are included on the route of this tour. The average age of the court square buildings, not including the courthouse or the newer bank building and county office building, is 115 years.

13 **Aid Hardware**
1 Court Square

The Aid building was built in 1914 after the first one was destroyed by fire. After the fire, the 42,000-square-foot structure was built with a state-of-the art sprinkler system on every floor, designed to be as fireproof as possible. Records show the construction cost to be \$25,000, a huge sum in 1914. After 105 years in business, Aid Hardware closed in 1990, and the Aid family opened an antique mall in the building which operated until 2024.

14 **Catron Opera House**
37 Court Square

Built in 1893, the Opera House served as the cultural and entertainment center for the town, including plays, music, and in later years, as an upstairs basketball court. Its construction followed the prosperity of the railroad. The first train arrived in West Plains on Christmas Day 1883 and ushered in a population explosion. In 1880, West Plains had a population of 350. Over the next decade the population grew to 2,091.

15 **Civil War Skirmish Site Historical Marker** | West Side of Court House

The only confrontation which occurred between Union and Confederate regulars in Howell County was at this site on Feb. 19, 1862. Six Confederate infantrymen were killed, eight wounded, and 40 taken prisoner. There were no Union casualties. The population of West Plains at that time was 150. By 1863 West Plains was burned to the ground by guerilla fighters. 16 **Howell County Courthouse**

This courthouse, completed in 1937, is the fourth courthouse for the county. The first courthouse was destroyed during the Civil War. The second one burned, taking with it the county records that had been hidden and protected throughout the war. The third courthouse was damaged so badly in the Bond Dance Hall explosion that it had to be torn down.

tipped off by the owner of Davidson Motor Company, located across the street, that three men having tires repaired seemed suspicious and were wearing clothes that looked like items taken from a recent robbery from C.C. McCallon's store. Sheriff Kelly stepped to his car to get his gun, slipping it under his coat. As he crossed East Main to question the men, Alvin Karpis, a member of the Ma Barker Gang, shot Sheriff Kelly, and the gang members fled in their car. It would be four and a half years before Karpis was tracked down and arrested by FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover.

19 Lincoln School
1400 E. Pony Thomas Street



Lincoln School

The West Plains African American community developed in the late 19th and early 20th centuries around the north end of Washington Avenue where the Lincoln School is located. First built in 1890, Lincoln School was rebuilt around 1920. It is this structure that continues to stand. The one-room building was the only African American educational facility in Howell County. It offered instruction only through the 8th grade.

In 1955 West Plains schools were desegregated, and classes were discontinued at Lincoln. However, as it had since its inception, the structure continued to serve as an important community meeting spot for African Americans in West Plains. Eventually, the building was used infrequently and fell into some disrepair. A major renovation project was undertaken in 2023 by West Plains residents Crockett and Tonya Oaks, who purchased the building from the City of West Plains. They are returning the building to its original use as an educational and cultural center. As development continues, art installations are already part of the project, including a large mural in the building and the Reflection Plaza on the east lawn. While founded during times of segregation, the newly renovated building is available for use by all.

18 Sheriff Kelly's Murder by the Ma Barker Gang | East Main Street

Just across the street from the Dance Hall explosion site is where Sheriff C. Roy Kelly was shot and killed on Dec. 19, 1931, minutes after exiting what was then the brand-new West Plains Post Office. As he exited the post office, the sheriff was quietly

20 Sadie Brown Cemetery

Established in the late 19th century, the cemetery rests on the homestead of Saint Leger "Sadie" Brown, a Methodist minister who had been enslaved. It is one of the only burial grounds established for the Black community in Howell County. Some of the graves are marked, but others are not. A research project is currently underway to identify unmarked graves and a recent grant will help in the quest to provide headstones.

PARKS

1 Butler Children's Park

Corner of Broadway & Halstead



A music-themed splash pad and an all-inclusive playground are the centerpiece of this park which is dedicated to children's activities and good times for families. In addition to this wonderful, water-fun feature, the park has playground equipment which was installed in 2006 when the park was remodeled. There is also a large pavilion, available on a first come, first serve basis, which is great for parties and get-togethers. Other amenities include walking trail, restrooms, picnic tables, benches, and trash receptacles.

2 Galloway Creek Nature Park

Galloway Creek Nature Park is a 40-acre tract featuring a 5.3-mile-long tributary creek that runs through the property. Areas in the park serve as a "green area" for wildlife, maintaining the natural habitat of native plants and animals. A covered bridge crosses the creek as part of the walking trail through the park. Other amenities include a restroom, a play area, barbecue grills, and picnic tables. A large pavilion is available for reservation.

3 Georgia White Walking Park

Thornburgh Street

Between Minnesota & Missouri



The Georgia White Walking Park features a lit .4-mile blacktopped walking track and greenspace. The park is named in honor of Georgia White, who in 1989 donated a portion of the land behind her home to the city of West Plains to develop a walking park.

As an interesting historical note, included in the park's tree population is a special tulip popular. Standing tall in the middle of the Georgia White Walking Park is an offspring of a tulip poplar that George Washington planted in 1775 at Mount Vernon, Virginia. The Missouri Department of Conservation, with assistance from the West Plains Rotary Club, planted the offspring tree April 3, 1991.


4 JMB Park | BB Highway



The JMB Park's main attraction is a disc golf course and a 3.7-mile, mixed use mountain bike trail. A small pavilion is available on a first come, first serve basis, and a larger, 3,500-square-foot pavilion can be reserved. Other amenities include picnic tables, barbecue grills, and restroom facilities.

5 Missouri Department of Conservation

The MDC Ozark Regional Office and recreational area is a 20-acre hidden gem right in the city limits of West Plains. It features a park, walking trails, a nature area that includes an educational pond, with a catch-and-release fishing opportunity for children 15 and younger from May to September. In addition to the trail and pond, the area has a backyard feeder/bird viewing area and pollinator-benefiting landscaping surrounding the building, with a picnic table and benches. In the office lobby, children can interact with a life-sized tent, draw and color outdoor photos at a picnic table, and view the native fish aquarium. Free MDC publications are available at this location.

6 People's Park/Aquatic Center

1136 W. Broadway St.



A large pavilion – 4,500 square feet – is at the heart of People's Park, but there are also picnic tables, barbecue grills, a short walking trail, a tennis court, and a basketball court. Restroom facilities are available. There is no charge to use park facilities, but there is a fee to reserve the pavilion for organized events.

The aquatic center consists of two swimming pools, including a large lap pool. The smaller pool is a zero-entrance pool and equipped with a mother's bench in the water, a mushroom waterfall, a frog slide for smaller children, and a large water slide located at the opposite end of the pool.

7 Robert Neathery Skate Park

The Robert Neathery Skate Park provides in-line and skateboard enthusiasts a layout designed especially for their sport, offering features to match all skill levels. In addition to the concrete skate areas, the park has a small pavilion.



.5 miles to Greer Mill: Continue on Highway 19 to the mill. It is on the left and easy to miss. There is not much of a parking area at the mill.

17.2 miles to Rockbridge: Continue on Highway 181 and go 7.2 miles then turn right on N Highway. Go 8 miles and cross over Highway 95. The entrance to Rockbridge is 2 miles ahead on the left.







Instead of going back the way you came to return to West Plains, you could drive through Eminence. There are several dining options there.



63 miles to Round Spring: Take Highway 63 north toward Willow Springs. Just before Willow Springs, take Highway 60 east toward Mountain View. After Mountain View, turn left on Highway 17. Stay on Highway 17 for 13 miles to Summersville. At Summersville, turn right on Highway 106. You will pass by Summersville Mill (tours by appointment). In 7 miles, continue straight on D Highway. Go 9 miles then turn left on Highway 19. In 5 miles, the entrance for Round Spring will be on your right.

2.2 miles to Echo Bluff: Continue on Highway 19 to the entrance of Echo Bluff State Park.


13.2 miles to Devil's Well: Continue on Highway 19 for 9.2 miles then turn left on KK Highway. In 2 miles, turn left on Devil's Well Road. Devil's Well will be ahead in 2 miles.

7 miles to Welch Spring: Backtrack to KK Highway and turn left. Go 3.8 miles then turn right on K Highway. Turn left on the first gravel road past the Akers Group Camp. At the end of the road, park next to the river and walk a trail north along the river for about a half mile. At the end of the trail you will be able to see the hospital ruins, although you will be across the river from it.

ALLEY SPRING MILL

37.1442141-91.4615359

- 7th largest spring in Missouri
- 81 million gallons per day
- Spring conduit extends at least 3,000 feet underground
- Spring lake approximately 155 feet deep
- Mill was built in 1894

"A mill was vital to community life, where grain was ground to provide the daily bread. The present building was constructed during 1893-1894 by George Washington McCaskill as a merchant mill. It was larger than most mills in the Jacks Fork area and replaced an earlier mill on this same site that was built by 1868. Originally unpainted, it was first painted white with green trim, then later the famous red color associated with Alley Mill today." ~ Cindy Von Halle

There are several things to see and do at Alley. Alley Mill is open to visitors. (Check days and times using links below). Informal tours are available upon request.

Storys Creek One Room Schoolhouse is within walking distance of the mill and has limited hours. A pavilion and public restrooms are available on the property.

Two hiking paths begin at the mill. One is a 1.8-mile loop that goes up the bluff to a breath-taking view of the mill. The other is a short walk around the mill pond and alongside the Alley Branch. It ends at a foot bridge leading back to the parking lot.

BOZE MILL

- 1880s turbine and rock wall still exists

Once the site of the Lucas Boze Grist Mill, the area was an important center of commerce where farmers had their wheat and corn ground into flour. All that remains is the historical 1880s turbine and hand-layered rock wall.

Boze Mill Spring forms a sparkling blue pool that runs into the spring branch above the remnants of the mill. Aquatic plants add many shades of green to the spring branch. Boze Mill is nestled in a beautiful glen beside the Eleven Point River just above Riverton.

Access from trailhead or from the Eleven Point River.







DAWT MILL

- Original mill established in 1866
- Current mill built in 1897
- Now home to Dawt Mill Resort

Dawt Mill has a rich history dating back to the original land grant of 1874. A Mill building has been on the land since 1866. In 1889 John Caldwell owned the property and a rival mill owner, Thomas Harkins, paid a young Thomas Carroll \$10 to burn the Mill down. Carroll was caught due to riding an easily trackable lame mule. Dawt was once a bustling town with a General Store, Post Office, Cotton Gin, Blacksmith Shop, Saw Mill and Grist Mill. There have been multiple caretakers that have each left their mark on the township; including Alva and Charles Hodgson who built the current Mill building circa 1897 along with the notable Hodgson Mill. In the 1920s Dawt Mill was owned by the Bushong family and had times where grain would be ground and cotton ginned day and night excluding Sundays. From 1930 through the mid 40s when many mills in the area were shutting down, owner Charles Thompson kept it going until selling to Ray and Fanny Hunt in 1945. The Hunts put in gas pumps and continued the milling process. In 1967 Wayne and Ruth Dinnell became the next owners and welcomed tourists with many improvements including building the Log Cabin and campsites. Between 1971 and 1994 the Fishers, Hornes, Smiths and Joe Stone were all stewards of Dawt Mill. It was sold again in 1995 to the current owners and has grown and changed with the times. Due to flooding and the dam being taken out Dawt is no longer a working Grist Mill. Today, Dawt Mill Resort offers seasonal dining and options for year round lodging, camping and floating. Please call for availability.

"To look at Dawt Mill today, it is hard to imagine a once bustling community where neighbors met as they waited to get their wheat and corn ground or their cotton



ginned. Now, in the summer, you can find floaters, families, friends and tourists coming to take in the beautiful Ozarks. Like the river, Dawt mill has been shaped and altered with the passage of time, but like the bedrock, it holds its place firmly in Ozark history."

FALLING SPRING MILL



The Falling Spring area was homesteaded in 1851 by Thomas and Jane Brown of Tennessee. One of four houses built at this site, the Thomas Brown Cabin still stands. The current mill was constructed in 1927. Its overshot wheel was used for power to grind corn, saw shingles and firewood, as well as generate electricity. Looking inside the mill, one can still see some of the original machinery in place.

The spring provides 500,000 gallons of water per day. During the Civil War, it is believed that soldiers camped in the area. Falling Spring was so busy at times that 10 to 12 wagons would be camped alongside the road in front of the spring.


The area is managed by the U.S. Forest Service and is a day-use area with picnic tables and pedestal grills.

GREER MILL

- Constructed in 1883
- Restored in 2016
- Sits on ridge above Greer Spring

In 1859, Samuel Greer, for whom the spring is named, purchased the spring. In 1860, Greer built a gristmill at the spring.


After returning from the Civil War, he found his mill burned. He rebuilt and resumed milling operations. Around 1870, he enlarged the mill, constructed a dam at the spring, installed a turbine waterwheel, and built a three-story mill building. The mill was used to grind corn, saw lumber, gin cotton, and card wool. He trained oxen to haul loads up and down the steep slope above the spring without a driver.

As more people settled in the area, the need for flour, lumber, and other milled products increased. In 1883, he rebuilt the dam and began construction of a new roller mill on top of the ridge above the spring. Materials and equipment were used from the old mill to construct the new mill. A unique cable system was used to transfer power from the turbine wheel at the spring to the new mill on top of the ridge. This is the mill that stands today.

HODGSON MILL

- Original mill built in 1861
- Current mill constructed in 1897
- 28 million gallons per day

Hodgson Mill was built in 1861 by William Holeman at the base of the cliff where Hodgson Spring discharges. The spring produces 28 million gallons of water per day. The mill closed during the Civil War and it is unclear whether Holeman reopened the mill or had to build a new one after the war. Holeman operated the mill until his death in 1879.

In 1884, the mill was purchased for \$500 by Alva Hodgson and his mother, Mary. Hodgson upgraded the machinery which made the mill capable of producing a higher quality “white” flour.


At the time, the mill building housed a general store, the Sycamore Post Office, sawmill, and cotton gin. Farmers visited the mill to have their grain (corn and wheat) ground into flour or meal.

A new mill was completed around 1897. This is the structure that stands today. Alva Hodgson's brother, George, bought 1/3 interest in the mill and by 1901, had purchased the mill entirely from his brother. Alva Hodgson went on to build nearby Dawt Mill, completed in 1909. Alva died in 1921 and George continued to operate the mill until his death in 1927.

Ownership of the mill passed to Fred O. Foster from 1927-1934. In 1934, the mill was purchased by businessman Charles Theodore Aid. The mill remained in the Aid family until 1998.


The mill suffered flood damage in 1982 when water rose into the main milling room.

Between 1985 and 1993, Herbert Smith (great-nephew of Alva Hodgson) and his wife leased the mill and provided tours, a store, resort cabins and campground.



In 1998, the mill was sold to Hank and Jean Macler who registered it in the National Register of Historic Places. In 2011, the mill was sold to John and Gwen Deakle.

KLEPZIG MILL



- Constructed in 1928

A small turbine mill built in 1928 by Walter Klepzig sits alongside Rocky Creek. Son of a Prussian German immigrant, Walter was a forward thinker, introducing barbed and woven fence wire and a refined breed of milk cow to the area. He sawed his own logs into boards to build his house and out-buildings. He even saved good boards to build coffins for neighbors. He would grind corn for free for neighbors who could not afford to pay.

Klepzig Mill was a sawmill house built by nailing vertical planks to a hand-hewn sill at the bottom and a sawn two-by-four plate at the top, replacing the customary log built structure of its time. Its foundation is piers of uncut and unmortared native stone.



ROCKBRIDGE MILL

- Mill built in 1868
- Now a resort and rainbow trout and game ranch

"Late in the summer of 1841 a group of families left Marion County, Kentucky, in three ox and horse drawn wagons led by Captain Kim Amyx. Their destination would require some 500 miles and six months of challenging travel. They were searching the unknown for a new life in the virgin wilderness of the Ozarks, and would end their journey near present-day Hodgson Mill.

It is reported that members of this wagon train, along with other previous settlers, set about to establish a new community known as Rockbridge. The original town and mill site was located near the confluence of Spring Creek and Bryant Creek. It was the county seat of Ozark County, and encompassed what today is three separate counties: Douglas, Howell, and Ozark. After a few short years, the town and mill were destroyed by fire during a civil war battle.

In 1868, B.V. Morris rebuilt the original mill on its present day location. The mill's reconstruction was followed by the reinstatement of the post office, a general store, Masonic Lodge, bank, church, school, blacksmith shop, and a large farmhouse. The village of Rockbridge was a gathering place for people from the countryside. A trip to the mill was a great occasion, enabling people to visit old friends and neighbors, to get their meal and flour, to utilize the post office, to vote on Election Day, and to get news of the outside world.

Activity flourished during the latter years of the 19th century and continued until the 1920s and 1930s, but as gasoline power and better roads came along, the need for the mill and the blacksmith shop gradually declined. Eventually there was not a need for the general store. The world changed and Rockbridge was almost aban-

doned. Only the post office remained to mark the existence of this once bustling community.

In 1946, the Amyx family moved to Rockbridge. Lile and Edith Amyx had a saw mill on the lower part of the stream. In 1954, the family began to develop the Rockbridge Rainbow Trout & Game Ranch." ~ <https://www.rockbridgemmo.com/>

- 10 million gallons per day
- Mill built in the mid-1800s

"Little is known about Topaz's early years. It's believed that Henry Schoolcraft initially discovered the settlement's spring in the early 1800s, which he dubbed Elkhorn Spring. Unfortunately, many other details around Topaz's existence are piecemeal." ~ <https://ozarksalive.com/topaz-a-spring-fed-time-capsule/>

Topaz Mill was built sometime between 1840 and 1850. Information shows that John Talley was the first to set up a store at the mill area. Richard Hutcheson bought the store from Talley around 1890, after which his brother Robartus relocated with his family from the St. Louis area.


Richard eventually became discouraged and sold out to his brother and moved away. Robartus saw the need for a bigger store and a post office. His wife was the postmistress at Topaz all the years they lived there.

Around the turn of the 20th century, a new mill and a new way to harness power for the mill was implemented. By raising the level of that spring 12 feet, running the spring water down a raceway, dumping it down a boiler flue on to a turbine, there was more power than with just the waterwheel.

Topaz grew and as is common in the Ozarks, became the gathering place of the locals. At one point there was a blacksmith, tomato canning factory, a garage, general store, and a barber shop.

By the 1940s, the town was almost gone. The mill made flour through the 1920s and ground corn through the 1930s. The post office closed in 1943 and the general store closed in 1945. The O'Neal family purchased the property in 1957. The third generation of the O'Neal family cares for the mill.





- 1.5 million gallons per day from bluff wall
- 1915 25-foot steel overshot wheel

What remains of Turner Mill is where the now extinct town of Surprise, Missouri, had its own post office from 1895 until 1925. In the early 1850s, G. W. Decker operated the original mill utilizing a wooden overshot wheel. In 1891, Jesse L. (Clay) Turner bought the mill. He refurbished the four-story mill building, rebuilt the wheel, and added a system of belts, pulleys and drive shafts. The mill had various types of saws for lumber and also equipment for grinding wheat and corn. Turner abandoned the wooden wheel for a turbine which furnished power until 1915. Then the turbine was replaced with the 25-foot steel overshot wheel that is visible today. The wheel was hauled to the site in sections by oxen. Logs were brought to the mill by floating them down the Eleven Point River. Teams of oxen hauled the logs out of the river and to the mill. At that time, roads were almost non-existent or in very poor condition.

THE OZARKS REGION is known for its many springs and waterfalls, and you'll encounter them frequently as you explore the natural areas around West Plains. This scenery is the backdrop for quiet rest as well as outdoor recreation.


Althea Spring is the 23rd largest spring in Missouri. It was named for the daughter of Dr. Paul Patrick who was an early owner. The spring was used to power a domestic power plant from 1958 to 1977. It comes up from rocks in the hillside and then runs downhill into the North Fork River.

Althea Spring is a popular stopping spot for floaters and is located in the Patrick Bridge Conservation area. It is accessible by land, too. Parking is available at Patrick Bridge then it's a short walk to the spring.



Big Spring was established as a state park in Missouri in 1924 and was developed by the Civilian Conservation Corps during the Depression era of the 1930s. The people of Missouri donated it, Alley Spring, and Round Spring to the National Park Service to become a part of the Ozark National Scenic Riverways in 1969.

Big Spring ranks up there with Idaho's Snake River Spring Complex and Florida's Silver Spring as the biggest spring in America. With an average daily flow of 286 million gallons of water, the water from Big Spring travels from as far as 45 miles away through a series of underground passages. Divers have discovered that the spring is at least 80 feet deep. As much as 70 tons of dissolved limestone is in the spring water each day. This is what gives the spring water its turquoise blue color.




Blue Spring is the 6th largest spring in the state with a daily discharge of 90 million gallons of water per day.



Rocky Falls is made of rhyolite, a hard rock. Typically, a stream erodes softer dolomite (a type of limestone) and makes a wider valley to travel through. Since the rhyolite is harder, the stream tends to stay within whatever cracks that it finds, deepening them only a little by erosion. This is how a "shut in" is formed. Rocky Falls can be visited year round and is a popular swimming hole in the summer.






WELCH SPRING



Welch Spring was named after Current River Welch who was born in 1859 and died in 1912. The Welch family ran a grist mill at the property until nearly 50 years after the Civil War.

In 1913, an Illinois doctor named C.H. Diehl bought Welch Spring for \$800 from Current River and Martha Welch's sons, James and Arnold. Dr. Diehl built a hospital over the mouth of Welch Cave believing that the cool, pollen-free air coming from the cave and the spring water had healing properties. Welch Spring, which flowed from the cave, was dammed up so the water would close off the entrance. This forced air from the cave opening into the hospital. Unfortunately, the hospital was not a success. Dr. Diehl died in 1940 and his family was not interested in keeping the property up. They sold the property and it was run as a trout fishing resort until the National Park Service purchased it in 1967.

A year-round outdoor destination for adventurers and nature lovers. The park features a lodge, cabins and campground. Other amenities include a restaurant, a gift shop, bluff-top shelter for special events, a 50-seat amphitheater, and hiking and mountain biking trails.

Echo Bluff State Park gets its name from the massive cliff towers rising above Sinking Creek. The State of Missouri developed this park after acquiring the property which was formerly Camp Zoe, a summer camp for children that opened in 1929.

Known as Missouri's "Little Grand Canyon," Grand Gulf State Park is breathtaking. Grand Gulf is a collapsed dolomite cave system that stretches about three-quarters of a mile between 130-foot-high walls. One can view Grand Gulf from trails on top or venture down to the floor to meander under a natural bridge which spans 250 feet with a 75-foot opening.


Water from Brussell Branch drains into Grand Gulf where it flows under the natural bridge before entering the mouth of an underground cave system. It then travels 9 miles underground and re-emerges at Mammoth Spring in Arkansas.

One of the earliest writings of exploring the area was from Luella Agnes Owen. From her book "Cave Regions of the Ozarks and Black Hills" (1898), she recounted her explorations of Grand Gulf including seeing numerous, small, eyeless fish that were pure white. In the 1920s, a severe storm washed many downed trees and other debris into the gulf, filling the cave.

Today, heavy rains fill the gulf to depths exceeding 100 feet. The water slowly drains out over a period of several weeks.

In 1971, Grand Gulf was designated a National Natural Landmark, and in 1984, the property became a Missouri State Park.







Mammoth Spring State Park, a National Natural Landmark, is Arkansas' largest spring and one of the world's largest springs. It forms a 10-acre lake then runs over a dam to start the Spring River.

Native Americans, particularly the Osage, inhabited the Mammoth Spring area for thousands of years prior to the arrival of Europeans. Recorded local history dates to the early 1800s, when settlers called the spring "Head of the River." In 1850, geologist David Dale Owen examined the spring itself, and the area became a tourist attraction. The first industry in the region was a simple wooden-wheel gristmill. While settlement was slow, a town did emerge just west of the spring, and the coming of the St. Louis-San Francisco Railway (Frisco) in 1883 launched an era of progress.

The 225-foot milldam provided power for a large flour production company, and the railroad brought tourists. A 56-room resort and many cabins welcomed summer guests. One of the earliest national fish hatcheries was established there in 1903.

In 1925, the Arkansas-Missouri Power Company bought rights to the dam and built a hydroelectric plant there that provided power until 1972. Mammoth Spring was approved as a state park in 1957. ~ <https://encyclopediaofarkansas.net/entries/mammoth-spring-state-park-1238/>



The valley surrounding the springs that form the Current River attracted settlers in the early 1800s. Early residents came to the area from New York and named their first post office after Montauk in Suffolk County, Long Island. Because of its proximity to the springs and its abundant supply of water power, the village of Montauk proved to be an excellent spot for milling. Four mills were constructed to serve the community. The last one, a gristmill built in 1896, still stands today and retains much of its original machinery. It is open seasonally for tours.

The next big step in the park's history was in 1926 when it became a Missouri state park. Members of the Civilian Conservation Corps built many of the amenities and structures in the park in the 1930s. Many of these structures still stand today, a testament to the craftsmanship of this era.

Montauk State Park is best known for being one of the three "trout parks" in the Missouri state park system. Canoe access is located just outside the park's southeast border, making Montauk State Park the perfect place to stay during a river adventure. ~


In the rolling hills of the Missouri Ozarks stands a legacy to the passing of time. The Homestead Act in the mid-1800s encouraged the Rippee family to move west and settle what is reputed to be the longest-lasting homestead in Missouri. The family raised many varieties of produce, birds and animals, and were quite skilled in the crafts of the region. They traded with the Osage Indians and cared for soldiers during the Civil War in their hand-hewn log-cabin.

Bakersville is situated on the original Rippee farm. The Baker Creek Seed Store now stands where the family's market garden once was. In 2007, construction began on the historic town. Besides the Baker Creek Seed Store, there is a donation-based vegan restaurant, speaker barn, an old-time mercantile, herbal apothecary, a natural bakery and blacksmith shop, two music barns, a Western jail, a native rock oven, a windmill, seed warehouses, and many breeds of historic poultry and livestock. The best part? It's free (except for festivals three times per year).

LEGEND OF 'BLUE MAN' OF THE HILLS REMEMBERED

The legend of Bigfoot began in the Ozarks in the winter of 1865 when a noted hunter from the eastern part of Douglas County, Sol Collins, who was past 60, was hunting game on the ridge that forms the watershed between the Big North Fork and Spring Creek. There was snow on the ground and Collins was tracking his game when he came upon a set of tracks somewhat like a bear. Old Sol had trailed and killed many a bear in his time, but these tracks were the largest and broadest that he had ever seen; and at each side of the tracks were marks in the snow such as might have been made by long claws.



He immediately took up the trail, determined to kill the biggest bear in Ozarks history. For hours he followed those great footprints far away to the north, almost to Indian Creek, then in a wide semi-circle to the west until he was close above the Big North Fork River. It was while he was climbing the north slope of Upper Twin mountain that he looked up and barely escaped being hit by a huge boulder that crashed by him. He barely escaped two more huge boulders that hurled down the hillside, and as he took shelter behind a big post oak, his blood froze to see, up on the hillside, a gigantic figure shaped like an immense man, stark naked, except for the skin of some animal around its waist and other wrappings of skin around his feet.

The creature was covered from head to foot with a tightly curling coat of short black hair, which as the sun struck upon it took on a dark blue hue. Collins always claimed that the giant was not less than nine feet tall, and his estimate is among the least of many made by other men in the years to follow.

Collins stared only long enough to make these observations before the creature cast aside the great ten foot club he carried and tore out another boulder from the frozen ground, hurling it with such deadly aim that the rock shattered against the huge post oak. The giant then lifted up his voice and made the hills echo with an ear-splitting scream more terrifying than ever came from any wild beast that roamed the woods. ~ Douglas County Herald





The wild horses of Shannon County have been roaming freely for almost 100 years when seven fillies and an Appaloosa stallion were turned out by farmers in a drought during the Depression. Today, there are five herds of about 50 horses total and they can be elusive with over 80,000 acres to roam around the Current and Jacks Fork rivers. The best places for viewing the horses are the Broadfoot Fields (north of Eminence), the Shawnee Fields (east of Eminence), or the fields above the two Rivers on Highway V.

RIVER ACCESS & SWIMMING HOLES

On hot summer days locals and visitors alike flock to the miles and miles of crystal-clear, spring-fed rivers of the Ozarks. Nothing is better than a dip or a float to get away from it all. Multiple outfitters are close by to rent canoes, kayaks, rafts or tubes and also offer shuttle service.

Summer in the Ozarks also means bugs and snakes. Water shoes are a must, as well as a cooler with drinks and snacks. Lawnchairs and a canopy for shade can make an afternoon at a swimming hole more enjoyable.

Accesses are listed below with mileage from initial access. Usually where there's river access, there's also a good place to swim. If floating, check local conditions and visit <https://missouricanoe.org/> or mdc.mo.gov for more information.

BIG PINEY RIVER

The Big Piney River is the largest tributary of the Gasconade River and is rated one of the best fishing streams. Numerous good-sized and beautiful springs feed the river so that it is floatable throughout the summer. (85.7 total miles of river, accesses listed for Texas County only. Visit website for full listing.)



CURRENT RIVER

ELEVEN POINT RIVER

The Eleven Point holds the scenic designation within the National Wild and Scenic Rivers system, meaning that it is free of impoundments, with shorelines or watersheds still largely primitive and shorelines largely undeveloped, but accessible in places by roads. Only about half of the land in the designated area is public, owned by the National Forest Service. The government holds a scenic easement on other land within the area that preserves its character for the future, but which does not allow public access to privately-held land.

GASCONADE RIVER

The Gasconade River is reputed to be one of the most crooked rivers in the world. Entirely in Missouri, the river winds nearly 300 miles from its source near Hartville to the Missouri River, which is only a distance of about 120 miles as the crow flies. (*Accesses in Wright County is listed.*)

0.0 Hwy. 38 Bridge on the Woods Fork of the Gasconade. Just above this point, there is a mill pond dam on the Woods Fork.





0.7 Lick Fork of Gasconade on right. Hwy. 38 Bridge 0.2 mile up this fork is also a possible put-in.

2.5 Camp Branch Access. Gravel ramp.

11.8 Low-water bridge on Hwy. E. Spring in bluff on left, just upstream from bridge.

12.3 Whetstone Creek on right.

12.9 Grimes Mill.

14.3 Buzzard Bluff Access, off Hwy. E. Gravel ramp.

19.4 Hwy. H Bridge. 21.5 Wilbur Allen Access, off Hwy. 95 on Radford Drive. Gravel ramp.

24.7 Burney Ford.

27.1 Ford access on Kincheloe Drive.

27.7 Beaver Creek on right adds a considerable amount of water to river.

28.1 Spring branch on left.

29.9 Elk Creek on left.

31.4 Watch for log jams and for stumps in riffles between this point and Hwy. O Bridge.

32.4 Hwy. O Bridge. No access.

JACKS FORK RIVER

This tributary of the Current River is one of the wildest and most scenic of the Missouri Ozark streams. Its deep valley is nearly a canyon, with no bottomland fields for the first 25 floatable miles. It is therefore advisable to camp well above river level if there is any chance of sudden rain. Trips with loaded canoes above Alley Spring are recommended only in spring or after good summer rains. The few miles immediately above Alley Spring are especially wide and shallow and may have to be walked in low water. Upper sections of the river provide fine fly fishing water.

0.0 MDC South Prong Access at Hwy. Y Bridge.

6.8 State Hwy. 17 Bridge at "Buck Hollow." Usual put-in for upper section of river. Park Service campground.

9.2 Salvation Army camp on left. Access, camp.

9.6 Blue Spring comes from cave on left nearly hidden from river by boulders. Narrow run just below spring may be difficult.

12.6 Jam Up Bluff and Cave. River entrance of cave is one of the most spectacular cave entrances in state.

15.9 Ebb and Flow Spring on left.

16.2 Rymers Access and campground on right.

17.1 Bunker Hill Resort on left. No access.

22.2 Leatherwood Creek on left.

25.2 Bay Creek on left. Access, camp.

31.0 Alley Spring, 10th largest spring in state. Old mill, camping, access.

32.3 Horse Hollow on left.

35.3 Mahan's Creek on right.

37.3 Eminence. Stores, cafes, lodging. Take-out at Lions Ball Park on right side, one-quarter mile below Hwy. 19 Bridge.

41.9 Shawnee Creek on right. Access, camp.

42.3 Little Shawnee Creek on right.

44.6 Confluence with Current River. Best take-out 0.75 mile downstream at ferry landing.

NORTH FORK RIVER

The North Fork of the White River combines a relatively constant flow of clear water from large springs with some of the best whitewater in the Missouri Ozarks. Since its upper reaches are in Mark Twain National Forest, it retains some wilderness character and has good watershed protection. The section from Hwy. 14 to Hwy. H is near-wilderness and includes some fine stands of short-leaf pine as well as several large springs. Old mills and a number of National Forest recreation areas enhance the attractiveness of the area for vacationers. Indeed, this river has high-quality recreation value equal to any in the Ozarks.

0.0 Hwy. 76 Bridge. Access.

0.5 Low-water bridge on connecting road between Hwys. 76 and E. Access.

6.6 Low-water bridge and spring at Topaz. An old mill remains standing. Access.

11.1 Slab ford. Access.

11.4 Indian Creek enters on left.

12.2 Osborn Ford low-water bridge in Round Valley, on County Road AH-260.

14.8 Hale Ford Bridge access on County Road 275.

16.1 Fiddle Springs Hollow on left.

18.7 Bridge on connecting road between Hwys. AA and 14. Hebron Access on left, on County Road 279 off Hwy. 14. Gravel ramp.

24.1 Hwy. 14 Bridge at Twin Bridges. Other bridge is over Spring Creek. Access and camping at resort. Store between bridges.

25.9 Spring Creek enters on left.

26.0 Hicks Spring on right just below the mouth of Spring Creek.

28.2 Mary's Hollow and creek on right.

Spring up hillside on opposite side of river.

29.2 Hammond Camp Access just off Hwy. CC. North Fork Recreation Area and campground on left.

29.9 Blue Spring on left, at river level. The flow is seldom less than 7 million gallons per day.

33.3 North Fork spring issues from rock ledge on left.

33.5 Upper branch of Rainbow (Double) Spring on right. Lower branch enters river 1500 feet downstream from source. Private use only.

35.0 McKee Bridge. Private use only.

36.0 The Falls is merely a rock ledge about 2-3 feet high.

39.2 Blair Bridge, concrete low-water bridge, on extension of Hwy. KK to Hwy. H. Access. It is necessary to pull boats over this bridge.

39.4 Blair Bridge Access on left, on County Road H-354 off Hwy. KK.

39.9 Private campground on right.

40.9 Spring Creek on left.

42.1 Hwy. H low-water bridge. Patrick Bridge Access at northeast side of bridge. Gravel ramp. Althea Spring, rated as Missouri's 23rd largest, is just downstream on the left.

42.3 Althea Spring Branch enters the river at a fast riffle.

43.6 Private campground on right.

45.3 Hwy. PP Bridge. This is a high bridge, but the old road goes down to the water for easy access.

47.1 Dam Bridge. Going under this bridge in high water is dangerous. Dawt Mill Resort on the left. Private access.

48.8 Repeating Riffle. This is the last drop when the lake is high.

49.1 Junction with Bryant Creek.

49.5 U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Tecumseh Access and campground on right.





HIKING

If you like to cover ground at your own pace, whether you're a casual stroller, serious hiker or somewhere in between, we've got pathways and trails for you! From short, easy jaunts to more challenging treks on sections of the Ozark Trail and more, there are lots of local excursion opportunities. Here's a rundown of some of them. They are listed in order of distance from West Plains. (If you're wanting to get your steps in during inclement weather, walking inside at the West Plains Civic Center is available on most days, depending on event schedule.)

BUTLER CHILDREN'S PARK

Corner of Broadway & Halstead, West Plains
Recent renovations at this park owned by the city include a paved walking path around the perimeter.

DON WARDEN PARK

Corner of Lincoln Ave. & Olden St., West Plains
City-owned, this small park is home to the West Plains Community Garden and includes mostly shaded, short walking paths which wind through and around the perimeter.

GALLOWAY CREEK NATURE PARK

2804 County Road 1770, West Plains
This 40-acre tract owned by the city includes mostly gentle-incline and paved walking trails which wind and loop through the park often alongside Galloway Creek. A covered bridge is an additional feature of the trail. Restroom on site.



GEORGIA WHITE WALKING PARK

Thornburgh Street, between Minnesota St. & Missouri Ave., West Plains

Owned by the city, this park is suitable for all. It features a .4-mile, blacktopped walking track and greenspace with mild inclines. Well-lit with LED lights, and in a residential neighborhood, it is a good option for any time, including early morning and evening use.

JMB PARK

BB Highway, West Plains

While the park's main attraction is a disc golf course, this city-owned property also features opportunities for walking, with paths that wind through the hilly terrain. A 3.7-mile mountain bike trail is designated as mixed use, offering a nice hiking opportunity near town. (From Highway 160 East take BB Highway/St. Louis St. north for 1.3 miles. Entrance to park is on the right.)

MISSOURI DEPARTMENT OF CONSERVATION

REGIONAL OFFICE

551 Joe Jones Blvd., West Plains

Within this 20-acre park, there are short hiking trails that wind through with different configurations possible. The trails feature a variety of grades and inclines and are mostly dirt and gravel. Narrow in some spots, they are not suitable for most wheelchair users or those who have unsure footing. There is an overlook deck that is accessible to all.

TINGLER PRAIRIE CONSERVATION AREA

This 240-acre nature area is managed by the Missouri Department of Conservation. There are three maintained looping trails which provide good access to the natural area: the Prairie Trail (1 mile); the Sinkhole Pond Trail (.5 mile); the Woodland Trail (1 mile). Map and directions available at Tingler Prairie Conservation Area on the mdc.gov website.



9 MILES FROM WEST PLAINS

From the junction of Highway 17 and Highway 63 in West Plains drive south on Highway 17 for about 6 miles. Turn right onto County Road 9100. Continue for 0.7 mile and turn left on County Road 8100. Drive 1.4 miles to the parking lot on the left.



DEAN DAVIS CONSERVATION AREA

The Missouri Department of Conservation maintains this 172-acre wildlife area which offers hunting opportunities in-season, but also includes a one-mile hiking trail which loops through forested and open areas and around a small fishing pond.



10 MILES FROM WEST PLAINS

Take Highway 63 north for 10 miles to County Road 2420. Turn right onto 2420 and continue 0.5 mile to the parking area on the left.

VANDERHOEF MEMORIAL STATE FOREST

An approximately mile-long, maintained hiking trail loops through the hardwood forest of this 140-acre state forest. The terrain and inclines vary. Accessible restroom facilities available in parking area. Map and directions: Archie and Gracie Vanderhoef Memorial State Forest, mdc.gov.

12 MILES FROM WEST PLAINS


From West Plains, take Highway 160 west for 3 miles to State Route JJ. Turn left on JJ and go 8 miles then turn left on County Road 9620. Continue on County Road 9620 for 0.5 mile, then bear right onto County Road 8110. Continue on 8110 for 0.5 mile to the parking area on the left.



GRAND GULF STATE PARK

The 322-acre park, sometimes called Missouri's "Little Grand Canyon," has short trails, boardwalks and overlooks where visitors can get a view from the edge of the cliffs. There also are maintained hiking trails around the perimeter of the canyon, one of which is a mile long.

25 MILES FROM WEST PLAINS
Take Highway 63 south toward Thayer. At Koshkonong, turn right on F Highway. After crossing the railroad tracks, turn left on County Road 377. Stay on CR 377 for 3.75 miles. This will be a dirt road. At W Highway, turn right. The entrance to Grand Gulf will be on the right in less than a half mile.

CANEY MOUNTAIN CONSERVATION AREA

Caney Mountain is a nearly 8,000-acre Missouri Department of Conservation-maintained area which includes opportunities for outdoor recreation and rugged terrain in a range of hills that can be viewed from a series of looping access roads. The Spout Spring Nature Trail offers hikers a 2.3-mile out-and-back opportunity to see Caney Creek up-close. It has an elevation gain of 147 feet and takes an average of just under an hour to complete. Other hikes (shorter and longer) are also possible in the area along various access and multi-use trails.

40 MILES FROM WEST PLAINS
Take CC Highway for 22 miles to Highway 181 at Dora. Turn left on 181 and continue for 18 miles. Turn right on Caney Mountain Headquarters Road and travel approximately 1 miles. Continue past the parking area to Main Forest Road #1 for 1.5 miles to Spout Spring Trailhead.

GREER SPRING TRAIL

This .9-mile trail provides access to Greer Spring – the second largest in Missouri – and travels through a mixture of hardwoods and pines providing year-round forest beauty. It descends about 250 feet in elevation along a gentle gradient from the trailhead on Missouri Highway 19. The trail is maintained and relatively smooth, however there is a moderately steep incline down to the spring.

41 MILES FROM WEST PLAINS
Take Highway 160 east toward Alton. In Alton, turn left on Highway 19 north. Go 8 miles and the parking area for Greer Spring and Trail will be on your left.

GIST RANCH CONSERVATION AREA

Within this 11,000-acre area in Texas County, there are 12 miles of hiking/biking/equestrian trails divided into loops of various distances, most of which are relatively easy to navigate. Small springs and wetland habitats within the heavily forested area are host to abundant flora and fauna species.



42 MILES FROM WEST PLAINS
Take Highway 63 north toward Willow Springs. Stay left on 63 North and 60 west at junction. At Willow Springs, take exit ramp for Highway 137 north. Continue right on 137 for 16.5 miles to Church Road (Road 4278). Turn right on Church Road for 0.3 mile to Nagle Road (Road 4450). On Nagle Road, turn left and continue for 0.2 mile to Ranch Road (Road 4552). Turn right on Ranch and continue for 3.5 miles to Gist Conservation on your left.

THE NARROWS (MORGAN SPRING FLOAT CAMP)

Also known as Morgan Spring Float Camp is part of the Mark Twain National Forest. Named for its razor back ridge between the Eleven Point River and Frederick Creek, this area boasts four large springs, including Blue Spring, Missouri's 8th largest; much natural beauty; and a rich history. When you arrive, you will come to a parking lot and a gated road. After you park, the rest of the way is on foot (.7 miles, steep downhill). At the parking area, take the path downhill to the campground. After hiking about 0.2 of a mile the Blue Springs Overlook will be on your right. From Blue Springs Overlook you continue a half mile over a rise, uphill for a short way before descending again to Morgan Spring. Once you get to Morgan Spring there is a short, more level, 0.2 of a mile, loop trail that will take you down to the campsites and river access. usda.gov

55 MILES FROM WEST PLAINS
Take Highway 63 south toward Thayer. At Thayer, turn left at the stoplight onto Highway 142. In approximately 23 miles, the entrance to The Narrows is on the left, just before crossing the Eleven Point River.



BRYANT CREEK STATE PARK

This recently developed, 2,900-acre state park features a host of natural attributes, including 2 miles of Bryant Creek frontage. Forests, sandstone outcrops and tributary hollows provide a scenic backdrop for the two developed hiking trails. For a short, easy hike try the Pinewoods Trail, a natural-surface, half-mile looping trail. The Pike Hollow Trail is more challenging. It offers a 4.5-mile loop which is rugged in places with some steep grades and inclines more than 10%. 49 MILES FROM WEST PLAINS
Take Highway 63 north toward Pomona. Turn left onto Highway 14. Stay

on 14 for 41 miles, then turn left onto Highway 95 at Gentryville. Travel just shy of 9 miles to Highway N and turn right toward Rockbridge. Continue on Highway N for 5.5 miles through Rockbridge to destination on your right. A suggested return route is the same distance back to West Plains but offers different, beautiful scenery and sites. From the park, turn left onto Highway N and continue south for 13 miles to Highway 181. Turn left onto 181 toward Dora and continue for 14 miles. At Dora, turn right onto CC Highway. Stay on CC for 22 miles back to West Plains.

ALLEY SPRING OVERLOOK TRAIL

This 1.7-mile loop trail is generally considered moderately challenging and has a gravel base. It starts at Alley Mill and includes a steep rocky ascent to an overlook which offers a birds-eye view of the famed Alley Spring and Mill. The trail continues along the ridge top through an upland pine-oak forest. This long segment of trail is level and easy walking. Following the ridge southward the trail dips down a series of switchbacks into the floodplain where Alley Spring Branch flows towards the Jacks Fork River. Descend to circle the beautiful, blue spring and see gorgeous, up-close views of the surrounding landscape, including the spring branch creek which feeds the Jacks

Fork River. A separate, short trail around the mill pond is also available.

54 MILES FROM WEST PLAINS

Take Highway 63 north toward Willow Springs. Just before Willow Springs, take Highway 60 east toward Mountain View. Stay on Highway 60 for 36 miles. Turn right on to County Road 60-C to Twin Pines area.

ROCKY FALLS & KLEPZIG MILL TRAIL

Klepzig Mill Trail is a 6-mile out-and-back trail near Winona. It begins at Rocky Falls and travels north on a portion of the Ozark trail passing through Buzzard Mountain ending at Klepzig Mill and Rocky Creek. It does include some water crossings which are at least ankle-deep and can be knee-deep during certain times of the year, so be prepared. Generally considered a moderately challenging route, it takes an average of just over 2 hours to complete. This trail is great for bird watching, camping, and hiking. It is open year-round and is beautiful to visit anytime. Dogs are welcome but must be on a leash.



PINEY RIVER NARROWS NATURAL AREA

Known to locals as "the Narrows," this 258-acre forested area near Houston, Missouri, includes a quick, 0.6-mile out-and-back trail. Generally considered an easy route, it winds through the woods next to the Big Piney River on Missouri Department of Conservation land.

53 MILES FROM WEST PLAINS

Take Highway 63 north toward Cabool for 32 miles. At the first Cabool exit, turn right to stay on 63 toward Houston. In 18 miles turn left on Hwy 17 north. Stay on Hwy 17 for 2.5 miles to Highway Z. Turn left onto Highway Z. The entrance to the parking lot will be almost immediately to your right.



61 MILES FROM WEST PLAINS

Take Highway 63 north toward Willow Springs. Just before Willow Springs, take Highway 60 east toward Mountain View. Stay on Highway 60 for 36 miles. Turn left on Highway 19 toward Winona. Go through Winona then turn right on H Highway. Stay on Highway H for 8.5 miles then turn right on NN Highway. In 2 miles, turn right on County Road 526. The trailhead begins by the parking area.

LICK LOG HOLLOW TRAIL

Located in the Angeline Conservation Area, this 1.2-mile loop trail is near Eminence, Missouri. Generally considered an easy route, it takes about a half-hour to com-

plete unless you stop to take in the natural features which abound in the area.



67 MILES FROM WEST PLAINS

Take Highway 63 north toward Willow Springs. Just before Willow Springs, take

Highway 60 east toward Mountain View. Stay on Highway 60 for 34 miles. Turn left on Highway 19 at Winona toward Eminence. Stay on Highway 19 for 14.5 miles. Turn right onto County Road 19-205. Stay on 19-205 for 0.5 mile. Entrance to trail will be on your right.

CEDAR GAP CONSERVATION AREA

The Cedar Gap Plateau is recognized as the second-highest point in Missouri. Headwaters of the Bryant Creek can be viewed at this conservation area along with limestone glades and oak/hickory forest. A gravel-surfaced trail leads from the parking lot to a valley overlook. This 0.5-mile trail can accommodate most hikers with some effort. For a more rugged hike, visitors can continue beyond the overlook and hike the 1.6-mile loop trail.



67 MILES FROM WEST PLAINS

Take Highway 63 north toward Willow Springs. Stay left on 63 North and 60

west at junction. Continue on Highway 60 west at Cabool. Past Mansfield take exit ramp for O Highway. At the top of the ramp, turn left and cross the overpass. Stay on O Highway/Pantherholler for 1 mile. Cedar Gap Conservation Area entrance is on the right.

BIG PINEY TRAIL

This 16.4-mile loop trail near Roby, Missouri in the Paddy Creek Wilderness area is generally considered a moderately challenging route. It takes an average of 6 and a half hours to complete. This is a popular trail for backpacking and hiking. It is open year-round and is beautiful to visit anytime.



74 MILES FROM WEST PLAINS

Take Highway 63 north toward Cabool for 32 miles. At the first Cabool exit, turn right to stay on 63 toward Houston. In 18 miles turn left on Hwy 17 north. Stay on Hwy 17 for 24 miles. Turn right (east) on gravel Forest Road 274, and go about .6 miles to Big Piney Trail parking on your left.

CAVE SPRING TRAIL

Devil's Well is an unusual "karst window" that was formed when the roof of a huge cavern, containing an underground lake, collapsed. The result was a large sinkhole, with an opening in the bottom through which you can view the lake. A 4.6-mile foot trail leads from Devil's Well to Cave Spring on the Current River. By walking the trail, you can see where the water in Devil's Well goes. It's a moderately strenuous hike.

79 MILES FROM WEST PLAINS

Take Highway 63 north toward Willow Springs. Just before Willow Springs, take Highway 60 east toward Mountain View. After Mountain View, turn left on Highway 17. Stay on Highway 17 for 13 miles to Summersville. At Summersville, turn right on Highway 106. In 7 miles, stay straight to continue on D Highway. In 9 miles, turn left on Highway 19. In 17.5 miles, turn left on KK Highway. In 2 miles, turn left on Devil's Well Road. Devil's Well will be ahead in 2 miles.

BLUE BUCK KNOB NAT'L FOREST SCENIC BYWAY

The Blue Buck Knob dissects 24 miles of the Mark Twain National Forest. The byway travels through farmland, open pastures, and densely wooded hillsides. Several overlooks treat adventurers to scenic panoramas. Points of interest include Indian Creek Overlook, Blue Buck Overlook, Noblett Recreation Area, and the Children's Forest/Blue Hole Trailhead where you can access the Ridge Runner and Ozark Trails.

11.5 MILES FROM WEST PLAINS

Take Highway 63 north. In 2 miles, turn left on Highway 14 and go 9.5 miles

then turn right on AP Highway where the scenic byway begins. Stay on AP Highway for 11 miles then turn right onto Highway 181. At the stop sign, turn left on Highway 181/Highway 76. In 3.5 miles, turn right to continue on Highway 181. In 10.5 miles, take the ramp to the right for Highway 60 East. At Willow Springs, take Highway 63 South to return to West Plains.

GLADE TOP TRAIL NATIONAL SCENIC BYWAY

The Glade Top is a two-lane, all-weather gravel road which cuts through the Mark Twain National Forest. It follows narrow ridge tops which offer scenic views including 7 overlook "pull-outs" which are especially beautiful in the fall. Along the way are opportunities for short walks. Picnicking and tent camping available (see website for more information).

68 MILES FROM WEST PLAINS

Take US Highway 160 west toward Gainesville. Continue on 160 for 56 miles through Gainesville to Lutie. At Lutie, turn right onto Highway 95 and continue for 12 miles to the Glade Top east entrance which will be on your left. Travel 23 miles on the trail to Highway 125. Turn left (south) on 125 and continue for 4.5 miles to Rueter. Turn left at Rueter onto Highway 160 east to return to West Plains.

THE OZARK TRAIL

- 390 miles of trail
- Primitive camping 100' from trail
- Hiking, mountain biking & horseback

The Ozark Trail, a combined effort of government agencies, a landowner, and environmental groups, created a council in 1977. Under their guidance, some 170+ miles of trail were constructed in 10 years. By joining existing trails, the Ozark Trail system had more than 200 miles of trail by 1991. In 2002, the Ozark Trail Association was founded. Continuing to maintain and expand the trail system, the association has received state and national recognition.

The North Fork Section of the Ozark Trail has a trailhead at Pomona, just 8 miles from West Plains. This trail combines the Ridge Runner trail and the Devil's Backbone Wilderness area.

Other trails close by include the Current River section, the Upper Current River section, the Eleven Point section, and the Between the Rivers section.


WEST PLAINS BIKE ROUTE

West Plains offers three relatively level bicycle routes inside the city limits, with the 5-mile Central Loop beginning and ending at the intersection of Lambert Lane and Bill Virdon Boulevard. The Zizzer Way is a spur off the 5-mile loop, beginning at Grace Avenue, extending past the three public schools, with a turn-around just past the West Plains Elementary School on Allen Street, and returning back to Grace Avenue. The Galloway Loop has parking at Galloway Park and ties into the Central Loop at Lincoln Avenue. Parking for the Central Loop is available across the street at East Towne Village.

The routes are marked with bicycle symbols and arrows on the streets, as well as green BIKE ROUTE signs with sponsor tabs along the routes.

WITTE'S END TRAIL



While there are not currently any officially designated dark sky parks in our immediate area, some of the darkest skies in the country are nearby. For those seeking beauty in the night sky, various maps can be found online to point you our way. Whether you're looking to catch a glance at meteors as they streak the sky, wanting to see the Milky Way and maybe capture an image of it with your camera, or just enjoy gazing up at the heav-


CLIMATE

The climate can be described as having an abundance of sunshine, low wind velocity, and mild temperatures. We love our four distinct seasons which provide a variety of changes in the landscape and weather. You will find temperatures in the spring typically averaging from 50-70 degrees, summers from 70s to 90s, fall temperatures matching the spring, and overall mild winters with infrequent dips below 20 degrees. The growing season is approximately seven months long, ranging from around the first of April to the end of October.



HOUSING


West Plains offers ample choices for housing. Our neighborhoods provide a safe, clean place to raise a family or enjoy your years of retirement. The average cost of a home ranges between \$130,000-\$170,000 for a three-bedroom, two bath, and a two-car garage. For renters, there is a selection of housing to choose from with rates averaging from \$450-\$800, including some unique opportunities for apartment living in our historic downtown and a converted mid-century motel. There are multiple housing choices and communities for seniors and retirees.

HEALTHCARE

 The West Plains medical community consists of more than 100 physicians, 10 dentists, and two orthodontists. Most are surprised at the vast number of specialists available in West Plains. In addition to general and family practitioners, there are specialists in anesthesiology, behavioral healthcare, cardiology, dermatology, ENT, emergency medicine, endocrinology, general surgery, hematology, infectious disease, neurology, obstetrics/gynecology, occupational therapy, medical oncology, orthopedics, pain management, pathology, pediatrics, physical therapy, podiatry, psychiatry, pulmonology, rheumatology, radiology, speech therapy, and wound care.

TAXES

The personal property and real estate tax rates in our area are an attractive incentive for folks looking to relocate from high-tax parts of the country. For specific information, contact the Howell County Assessor's office, 417-256-8284. The sales tax rate in town is less than 9.5% and includes a special 2% capital improvement tax which has been renewed several times by vote of the people due to its well-received and successful funding of a host of projects, ranging from major infrastructure upgrades to sidewalk expansion to parks and recreation improvements. The tax is what provided initial funding for our civic center.



EDUCATION

The West Plains R-7 School District has approximately 2,700 students who attend classes in grades K-12. The district employs over 400 people, with 240 of those as classroom teachers, boasting a 17:1 student-to-teacher ratio. Our high school is consistently rated one of the best in the state and country. Additionally, there are five rural elementary schools in the immediate West Plains area which send their students to West Plains High School or to one of several other smaller high schools in the county. This situation offers families a unique opportunity to choose a high school experience which ranges from a student population of less than 100 to one which has 1,300 students, in the case of West Plains High School.

Private school options are available for K-12 students. There is a large and active homeschool community, which offers opportunities for collaboration and networking.



POST-SECONDARY & HIGHER EDUCATION

Missouri State University-West Plains (MSU-WP) is a public, two-year, open admission, separately accredited campus of the Missouri State University System. A full college experience with quality instruction in a relaxed, personal atmosphere is the hallmark of MSU-WP.



An online degree program is also available. There is a selection of university housing for students and a wide assortment of student activities, including intercollegiate athletics. There is a rigorous transfer program as well as two-year career programs. Advanced technical training is offered at the Greater Ozarks Center for Advanced Technology (GO-CAT). The Terry L. (Bo) Pace Advanced Welding and Fabrication Program offers additional options for vocational training through MSU-WP. The Outreach Program at MSU's Springfield campus offers several undergraduate and graduate degrees on the West Plains Campus. Additionally, the West Plains R-7 School District's Southern Missouri Technical Institute uses industry standards and state-of-the-art technology to develop a high-quality workforce.



COMMUNITY EDUCATION RESOURCES

The Howell County office for Missouri University Extension in West Plains offers specialists and resources to further the goals of finding solutions for residents in various categories, including growing safe and healthy food; building and growing profitable businesses; improving health; increasing agricultural production; and engaging youth as valued, contributing citizens through 4-H and other programs.

The city-owned public library includes a children's section with activities and reading programs for youngsters, a genealogy area, and special programming for adults. A Library of Things has recently been added with a variety of practical items available to be loaned out. The Garnett Library on the campus of Missouri State University-West Plains is open to community members in the university's seven-county service area. It is also home of the Ozarks Heritage Research Center.



ARTS & CULTURE

Since 1975, the West Plains Council on the Arts has been the leading agency in hosting performing arts and cultural events from outside the area while also recognizing the contributions of local artists and musicians, including that it hosts the annual Ozark Heritage Festival. Established in 1994, the two-day festival is held the third weekend in October and is the signature event for West Plains. Over the years other venues have also become art-opportunity providers, including the Civic Center, the Harlin Museum, Missouri State University-West Plains, The Yellow House Community Arts Center, and several private businesses. Downtown art strolls have been gaining traction. Art shows, classes, and workshops happen at various venues in the area and are increasingly becoming a vital part of adding to our quality of life.





From our longstanding tradition of hosting pie suppers and auctions for our neighbors in need to organizing fundraising events for local causes, our area prides itself on its service to others. If you're looking for a way to get involved, there is an active non-profit community with dozens of charitable and service organizations to join. Rotary, Lions, Optimists, Kiwanis, Habitat for Humanity, the American Red Cross, VFW, Elks, and Amvets are some of the national organizations which have chapters here. Beyond that, we have local nonprofits and agencies involved in children's causes, serving the Disability Community, sheltering vulnerable populations, the arts, and animal welfare, to name a few. There is a United Way, a community foundation, and a Boys and Girls Club. Churches abound as well. If you want to serve others, there are organizations here to help you find and fulfill your passion and purpose.

ENTERTAINMENT

There are several area venues which regularly offer live music featuring local and regional musicians and bands which play a variety of genres. Community theater is alive and well, offering opportunities to get involved on stage, behind the scenes, or as an audience

member in various productions throughout the year. A long-established bluegrass music community, with its own outdoor music venue, hosts a spring and fall show, annually. Craft fairs, festivals, parades, and other special events are scheduled regularly throughout the year. Roller skating, bowling, movie theaters, axe throwing, and an active cornhole community are some of the activities available. Country, rock, and Christian radio stations, along with National Public Radio and public access television round out entertainment options.



RECREATION

Aside from the endless ways to get outside and enjoy the opportunities in nature which surround West Plains, we have lots of fun stuff to do in town within our parks and recreation department which offers multiple ball-fields, tennis courts, a skate park, and the Jimmie Carroll Sports Complex for indoor sports, year-round. There are recreational leagues for adults and children for both summer and winter sports, including a recently added pickle ball league. Several playgrounds offer equipment for kids, including a specially designed all-inclusive playground. There is a splash pad, an aquatic park, an indoor pool at the civic center, a municipal golf course, and a disc golf park. There are walking trails, marked routes in town for a growing bicycle-enthusiast community, and a dog park. One of the city parks is host to a community garden.
